RELIGIOUS EDUCATION CHILDREN WHO ATTEND PUBLIC/PRIVATE SCHOOLS

If you have a child who is or will be attending a Public, Private or home schooled, parents will need to register them for Religious Education program at St Joseph Catholic Parish, Guelph. This program will teach Catholicism to children in Grades 1 through 7. In order to receive sacraments, children MUST have some Catechism classes. If they have been in Public Schools for years, they may not be able to receive the sacraments in the year they wish to receive them – there will be some catching up to do. ANDREW KIM TAEGON, PAUL CHONG HASANG AND COMPANIONS

During the 17th century the Christian faith was brought to Korea through the zeal of lay persons. From the very beginning these Christians suffered terrible persecutions and many suffered martyrdom during the 19th century. Today's feast honors a group of 103 martyrs. Notable of these were



Andrew Kim Taegon, the first Korean priest, and the lay apostle, Paul Chong Hasang. Also among the Korean martyrs were three bishops and seven priests, but for the most part they were heroic laity, men and women, married and single of all ages. They were canonized by Pope John Paul II on May 6, 1984.

SAINT MATTHEW APOSTLE AND EVANGELIST- SEPTEMBER 21^{ST}



At the time that Jesus summoned him to follow Him, Matthew was a publican, that is, a tax-collector for the Romans. His profession was hateful to the Jews because it reminded them of their subjection; the publican, also, was regarded by the pharisees as the typical sinner. St. Matthew is known to us principally as an Evangelist. He was the first to put down in writing our Lord's

teaching and the account of His life. His Gospel was written in Aramaic, the language that our Lord Himself spoke. Not much else is known about Matthew. According to tradition, he preached in Egypt and Ethiopia and further places East. Some legends say he lived until his nineties, dying a peaceful death, others say he died a martyr's death. In the traditional symbolization of the evangelists, based on Ezech. 1:5-10 and Rev. 4:6-7, the image of the winged man is accorded to Matthew because his Gospel begins with the human genealogy of Christ.

COLLECTION FOR THE NEEDS OF THE CHURCH IN CANADA SEPTEMBER 19, 2021

Why is there such a collection?

Every year, the Bishops of Canada make an appeal for financial assistance to support their work and the work of each diocese by means of the Collection for the Needs of the Church in Canada. The President of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB), the Most Reverend Paul-André Durocher, Archbishop of Gatineau, has described this Collection as "an opportunity to all the faithful to help their dioceses collaborate in financing the regional episcopal assemblies (the Atlantic, Quebec, Ontario, and the West) and also the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB). These associations support the Bishops in their local ministry and in working together on issues of common concern." Any additional revenues raised help the diocese support its own diocesan pastoral programs and other activities. The CCCB is the national assembly of the Catholic Bishops in Canada, and includes the Bishops of the Eastern Catholic Churches.

CHARITY

At the Last Supper, Christ said to his Apostles: "I have a new commandment to give you, that you are to love one another; that your love for one another is to be like the love I have borne you. The mark by which all men will know you are my disciples will be the love you bear one another." This command of Christ was wonderfully carried out in the early Church, as pagans remarked: "See how the Christians love one another." Today there are many pagans. And they too are watching the followers of Christ to see if the Christians are still loyal to Christ and love one another and all people. In a world where hate is so common and love so needed, they look hopefully to Christians. But a Christian can forget that he should love God above all things as a friend. He can forget that God wants all persons to be his friends and that he should treat all men as God's friends. He can forget that love of God is shown in deeds, not mere words. He can allow his life to be ruled by feelings and not by Christ's Golden Rule. He can be uncharitable in his speech. He can be cruel and rude toward his fellow men who most need his sympathy and help. He can let prejudices rule his attitudes toward those of other races. He can forget that there are people lying wounded on the roads today as well as in the time of Jesus, though perhaps in a different way. But each time the Christian does one of these acts the pagans of today have reason for saying: "This person must not be a Christian." For even pagans know that the heart of Christianity is love of God and neighbour.
